#### from your executive committee

### from the Treasurer, Jacek Cywinski

Hello! It is me again with an update on Mensa International finances. I want to focus on the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2022, as a final version of the budget for 2023 will be available after the 2023 IBD meeting in Dallas.

Moreover, I would like you to come to Australia in October 2024 for two amazing events – details at the end of my column.

#### 2022 Financial statements

Independent auditors issued their opinion that they are satisfied that our financial statements were prepared in accordance with required standards and legal requirements, and that they represent a true and fair view of the state of Mensa International Limited's fiscal affairs as at 31 December 2022, and of its profit for the year then ended.

That essentially means that someone independent, who is suitably qualified and experienced, audited our financial statements and they did not identify anything concerning. By the way, it never means full assurance. I will share with you the most important highlights.

Firstly, let's focus on our Profit and Loss. The income statement for the year ended 31 December 2022 shows a healthy surplus of 58,883 GBP, with revenue sitting at 371,802 GBP and costs at 312,919 GBP. Although our component income has increased by 7% in comparison to the 2021 financial year, we have earned less money from our trademark, due to expiry of the Hasbro contract.

On the expenses side, the highest cost is running the Mensa International Office (36%), followed by legal and name protection expenses (30%) and organisation of the IBD meeting (21%).

Secondly, let's discuss our balance sheet. Our net assets increased by 7%, which is mostly reflected in growth of balances of our bank accounts. As of 31 December 2022, Mensa International had 1,055,414 GBP in bank accounts (almost double the amount we had on 31 December 2019), which shows that he have accumulated a healthy level of reserves over the last three years.

That makes the organisation well-cushioned in case of any unexpected "turbulences" and prepared for major projects, such as the CRM



or adaptive testing.

#### 2023 - the year in progress

There is still a lot of uncertainty regarding the 2023 financial year, which should be partially resolved by the time you will read this information in the MWJ. Mainly, we are unsure about the cost of travel to the IBD meeting in Dallas. I'm sure you are aware that cost of travelling has skyrocketed, which doesn't help with making predictions. Additionally, some delegates cannot make their travel arrangements early due to a variety of other commitments, which increases the uncertainty. While the majority of the travel expenses claims are received by the

end of October, some delegates will file their reimbursement claims in December 2023. Just a bit of trivia here – we will not accept any late claims (the cut-off date is 15 January 2024).

Next year's IBD meeting will be organised in Perth on 10-13 October 2024. As an across the ditch neighbour (that's how New Zealanders refer to Australia), I would like you to pencil in this event. I have been to Australian Mensa Conferences multiple times, and they are always well-organised and planned, and reasonably priced. I just got back from the conference in Melbourne and it was so worth it, even if I was just there for a weekend.

Local Mensans are very friendly and you definitely can count on interesting discussions or a party, whatever rocks your boat.

## The Gift of Communication

Have you ever wondered what it would be like to lack the means of communication and to be unable to interact cerebrally with the world around us? Imagine having no means of self-expression: not being able to communicate the most basic facts about yourself: 'I am too hot', 'I am hungry' or about your environment: 'I hate this TV show I am put in front of every day', or 'I wish you hadn't painted my room this painful pink'. Imagine being unable to convey your deepest feelings: 'I love you'; 'I appreciate all you are doing for me.' It would be a dark and dreary, empty world. Such isolation is hard to imagine.

And yet Mensan **Peter Shann Ford** did imagine it, and proceeded to do something about it.

Ford himself is a great communicator. As a TV personality with Cable News Network (CNN) in America, he brought information and ideas from around the world to viewers, and as a Channel 7 anchor in Australia he brought us news of international and regional events.

From at the forefront of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, Ford provided us with insights into the horrors and hardships our fellow humans were undergoing.

As an author, he gave us a deeper understanding of the lifestyle and belief systems of Australia's indigenous people<sup>1</sup>. After covering the NASA Space Program - while working for CNN - for more than a decade, he hosted Neil Armstrong on Sydney Harbour. Ford brought the legendary Armstrong (*pictured at left in the photo*), one of the world's greatest aviators and astronauts, to

life in a moving tribute<sup>2</sup> for readers of *The Australian* newspaper.

While at CNN, Ford had become a programmer/analyst on the first team developing microcomputers for rehab and communications for the disabled at the US Veterans Administration<sup>3</sup>.

Working with Principal Investigator Gary Kelly, Ford wrote a program which enabled people with neuromuscular disease and spinal cord injuries to replace a computer keyboard with a joystick controller<sup>4</sup> which facilitated communications for thousands.

Peter once addressed a formal Mensa gathering about the potential powers of the then "Information Superhighway". In the ensuing years he has explored those potential powers, not only with regard to general communication, but with a particular regard to its function as a medium for self-expression.

On meeting the late Stephen Hawking, the British physicist who suffered from Motor Neurone Disease, Ford was struck anew by the tragedy of a great mind being trapped within the physical confines of Hawking's body. How could



Ford's own digital explorations facilitate or enable a physically restricted person to release the wealth of knowledge and emotion and memories stored within? Always ready for a mental challenge, Ford grappled with the problem and – amazingly – found a specific digital solution!

Ford invented the *NeuroSwitch* an electromyograph-based communications and control system - which allows people suffering from profound disabilities such as Locked In Syndrome and Motor Neurone Disease to use the brain's EMG signals to control their computers.

And eventually Ford founded the software company, *Control Bionics*, a neural systems technology company<sup>5</sup> which has continued to explore ways of enabling and facilitating communication for those who have had to go without.

Ford was named NSW Senior Australian of the year in 2014. The following year he was a winner of *The National Disability Award for Excellence in Accessible Technology*, for his outstanding efforts to

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### Vale Udo Schultz - may you rest in peace

We are mourning the loss of our much-loved member Udo Schultz, who passed away on August 15. He died peacefully surrounded by his family.


Udo was a headstone; a human of the very first order. Since 1982, he had been a member of Mensa - no. 81. At that time, the number of members was noticeably only double-digits. Everyone knew that Mensa life was organised by letter and telephone.

But Udo wasn't just always around. He

stepped in and took responsibility. The list of his national and international positions is long: LocSec in Kiel, Ortsblatt-Eddi (MinSH), Test Manager, Honorary President of Mensa International, Ex-MinD Chairman, Honorary Member of Mensa in Germany, Ex-Development Director, Ex-International Chairman.

Also, and Udo put great value on this: Chairman of the church music association of his church congregation and chairman of the Tanzania community partnership group (He was a bass singer singer in the congregation office and in a gospel choir.)

His family held priority above all Mensa life; wife Sigrid and daughters Megan and Arwen Amelie - all of them also Mensans. Udo was a family person, local patriot (lifetime Kieler) and elected Welshman. His second childhood home is called Abergavenny and it is located in South Wales.



Udo was always approachable and sociable. Whoever put in a request received a prompt and mostly positive response - he was friendly, helpful and attentive. And Udo had a wonderful sense of humour. When he began to tell stories, you had to get ready for a long and fun evening. He could laugh at himself and generally not take himself too seriously.

Udo had to undergo major heart surgery in early 2022. He slowly recovered from this, but as soon as it was possible, he took up all positions again. He turned 80 this year and he celebrated in a quite Udo-like way for three days.

Udo will be greatly missed. Our thoughts are with him and his family.

#### Brain's Weight Switch Found: Eat What You Want, Lose Weight With New Treatment

Scientists have identified astrocytes, star-shaped brain cells, as pivotal in controlling obesity by acting on the GABRA5 cluster of neurons. The novel drug, KDS2010, has been shown to stimulate weight loss in obese mice without impacting their high-fat diet or food consumption, presenting a revolutionary avenue in obesity treatment.

# **International Elections 2024**

#### Notice Inviting Nominations for the International Election 2024

In accordance with Article X of the Constitution of Mensa, the International Election Committee (IEC) invites registration of Candidates and nominations for the following internationally elected offices:

#### INTERNATIONAL CHAIRMAN INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR-ADMINISTRATION INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR-DEVELOPMENT INTERNATIONAL TREASURER

#### **Registration of Candidates**

Candidates for the 2024 Election must personally register their interest in being nominated for a specific position and must secure at least one nomination as detailed in the nomination process below to be permitted to stand in the election. Eligible members may register their interest in being nominated by completing the Registration Form and submitting their documentation.

Eligibility criteria and instructions for registration may be obtained from the IEC at <u>iec@mensa.org</u> The closing date for registration of Candidates is 23:59 UTC 4<sup>th</sup> of January 2024.

#### **Nomination Process**

After registration closes, the candidates seeking nomination will be verified by the IEC. After the verification process has been completed, a list of all candidates available for nomination will be published in appropriate channels and available via email from the IEC at <u>iec@mensa.org</u>. Nominations may be lodged for any or all positions by National Mensa Groups or by petition from members. The closing date for all nominations is 23:59 UTC 1<sup>st</sup> of February 2024.

Instructions for submission of nominations can be obtained from the IEC at iec@mensa.org.

#### Nomination by National Mensa Committees

National Mensa Committees may nominate a registered candidate or a slate of candidates for any or all offices by submitting the name(s) of such registered candidate(s). A national Mensa group may nominate more than one individual for each office. Instructions for the Nomination process will be provided to National Mensa Committees with the list of verified Candidates.

#### Nomination by members

Members may nominate a registered potential candidate or a slate of candidates for any or all offices by submitting:

- 1. the name(s) of such registered candidate(s);
- a petition signed by at least 100 members who are in good standing as of 1<sup>st</sup> of January, 2024;
- 3. verification of such good standing.

# member profile

Avner Mandelman of Mensa Canada has achieved accolades in three different careers: rocket scientist, financier, and award-winning author.

Born in Tel Aviv during the Israeli War of Independence, Avner had a bucolic childhood with his two younger siblings (who still live in Israel). He describes a sense of connectedness among citizens, and despite frequent border incidents, the country was safe and children could roam anywhere.

Fascinated by model airplanes at a young age, Avner became Israeli Free Flight model airplane champion when he was 15. He was part of the Israeli delegation to the 1967 FAA championships in Prague when he was only 19. However, Israel had just won the 1967 war (in which he fought), trouncing Arab forces armed with Russian weapons.

So the Soviet Union did not allow the Israeli delegation to participate. This disappointment was Avner's first inkling that politics influence everyone's daily life, a fact that led him to develop a lifelong passion for finding out "how things really work."

Following his service in the Israeli Air Force during the 1967 war, Avner attended the Israeli Technion, earning a BSc degree in aeronautical engineering in 1972. He also began to fly gliders, and, in his spare time, learned to box. From 1972-73 he spent a magical year in Paris as an apprentice engineer and young man about town. After a year in the city of lights, Avner moved to Canada, worked first at the TRIUMF particle accelerator in Vancouver, then at De Havilland

aircraft in Toronto. He left engineering to attend Stanford's Graduate School of Business, graduating in 1976.

A pivotal business experience was the required Human Emotions lab, where students learned to stand up to their protective brain block that prevents them from taking in information that hurts their feelings. Avner says forcing yourself to think against your own grain is crucial for both good writing and good investing.

After Stanford, Avner went to work on Bay Street (Canada's Wall Street), first in Mergers and Acquisitions, then in institutional brokerages, turning around one brokerage company and helping another become #1 in Canada. After a decade and a half on Bay Street, Avner took some time off to get an MA in Creative Writing from San Francisco State University. He then returned to Canada, embarked on a hedge fund career and wrote a few well received story collections and a novel.



Since retiring 5 years ago, he's been writing fiction as well as books on investing. His thriller *The Debba*, won the Arthur Ellis award for best mystery. His follow up thriller, *The Undertaker's Daughter*, will be published soon.

Avner has two grown sons, and for the last 15 years the company of Marjorie, the love of his life.

Avner's advice for writers is: Ask yourself: What do I know in my heart to be true, yet keep denying? What do I know in my heart to be false yet keep affirming?

Write about that. Then get half a dozen creative writing instruction books and practise the basics an hour a day. You'll have an insurmountable edge over those who don't do this.

# supplementally... by John Blinke

#### Sky Time

It's hard to imagine a better night for Perseid meteor watching. Light breeze. No mosquitos. 16 degrees C. Predawn with thin clouds that let bright stars shine clearly. I saw two Perseid meteors, two bright planets, one GPS satellite. Half a dozen fireflies, all in a half hour. What could be better? Well, a dark sky would be better. In my neighborhood, visible stars have to be bright because of light pollution! I can't see anything dimmer than fourth magnitude.

It does not have to be like this. A bit of care in the choice of municipal outdoor lights could reduce the problem greatly. By directing most light downward, dark sky fixtures could make better use of electrical power, spare the sky, and would make life easier for migrating birds, too. #### **Thermal Vision**

ScienceDaily, August 1, 2023. "Thermal Imaging Innovation Allows AI To See Through Pitch Darkness Like Broad Daylight." (Nature)

In film photography, the colours yellow, cyan, and magenta, are combined to make full colour images. Scientists at Purdue and Michigan State University have done a similar trick with thermal infrared, but it wasn't easy. They used specialised infrared cameras and a lot of help from artificial



intelligence. The technique is called HADAR, for "heat assisted detection and ranging" and it can see fine detail in total darkness or in bright daylight. Instead of three "colours," HADAR employs many frequencies in the infrared spectrum and relies on AI algorithms to create images useful for robots or self-driving cars. There is plenty of room for improvement as the hardware is bulky and the processing is too slow for real-time use.

#### Mammals Strike Back

ScienceDaily, July 18, 2023. "Unusual Fossil Shows Rare Evidence Of A Mammal Attacking A Dinosaur." (Scientific Reports) Dinosaurs dominated the landscape for many millions of years. But mammals got in a few licks now and then. This is seen in a unique Chinese fossil that preserves a battle between a dog-sized mammal named *Repenomamus robustus* and a somewhat larger, parrot-faced reptile named *Psittacosaurus*. The two were elegantly preserved in the midst of their life and death struggle which both lost to a nearby volcanic eruption. The mammal was on the back of the dinosaur, biting its face and possibly eating it alive as some modern African carnivores still do. The bones of both creatures were so intertwined that they were almost certainly in the same position when they died.

#### **Dinosaur Race Track**

ScienceDaily August 14, 2023. "Scientists Explore Dinosaur 'Coliseum' In Denali National Park." (Historical Biology) Scientists from University of Alaska, Fairbanks, knew that Alaska's Denali National Park was a great place to see 70 million year old dinosaur tracks on the petrified shore of an ancient watering hole. But they did not know how special the place was until they visited with the sun at just the right angle. Then, they could see that generations of

many kinds of dinosaurs had left footprints there. The detail was wonderful, with toe marks and skin textures clearly preserved. Together with fossil plants, pollen, and evidence of shellfish and other invertebrates, the scientists could see the place had been a huge ancient river system. The resident animals were duckbills, ceratopsians, theropods, and wading birds. Plants included ferns, horsetails, conifers and deciduous trees.

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


#### Cryptosum
